The tour concludes in style at *Musée des Confluences*, a contemporary showcase of Lyon's ability to embrace the challenges of the modern world while staying true to its origins.

Lyon's heritage is much more than just a legacy: it's a living, ever-evolving treasure. In Lyon, heritage is not static; it's constantly reinvented through cultural initiatives, making every walk a new discovery.



Fête des Lumières de Lyon: an annual enchantment

Every December, Lyon is illuminated with thousands of lights to celebrate the Fête des Lumières. Over the decades, the event has transformed from a religious tradition into an internationally renowned cultural and artistic festival.

Since the 1990s, the City of Lyon has invited artists from around the world to create light installations that take over many of the city's streets. Today, nearly 2 million visitors come to experience the Fête des Lumières, drawn by the magic of the illuminations and the unique atmosphere of the festival. While the tradition of lighting up the city on December 8 remains a central element of the celebration, the artistic installations have continued to evolve and become ever more complex. Spectacular light displays now fill streets, squares, and monuments, offering visitors a truly magical experience.

With sustainability in mind, the City of Lyon has implemented strict measures to reduce the environmental impact of *Fête des Lumières*. To strike a balance between enchantment and ecology, the city prioritizes the use of low-energy lighting technologies.

The 25th edition of **Fête des Lumières** takes place from December 5 to 8, 2024.

Nuits de Fourvière: a summer under the stars

Each summer, the ancient Fourvière Theatre, a jewel of Roman architecture, hosts the Nuits de Fourvière festival. This internationally acclaimed event offers an eclectic mix of music, theatre, dance, and circus. Set in an exceptional venue, audiences can enjoy high-quality performances and experience powerful emotions.

With over 100 shows in music, theatre, dance, circus, and opera, the festival invites attendees to be surprised by the diversity of artistic expression. Audiences will discover not only their favorite headliners but also new performances and emerging artists, both international and local. It's a chance to come together, to share in the magic, and to enrich oneself through encounters with others.

In 2025, the **Nuits de Fourvière** festival will take place between June and July.

Quais du Polar: a literary investigation

Every year, thriller fans gather in Lyon for the *Quais du Polar* festival. This unique event immerses visitors in the world of crime fiction, with author meetings, exhibitions, events, and a major urban investigation where participants are invited to solve a mystery as they explore the city.

Quais du Polar has become the must-attend event for thriller fans in France. Now a staple of the French and European cultural scene, the festival is recognized by both professionals in the book and publishing industries and the public, who come in ever-growing numbers.

The 21st edition of the **Quais du Polar** festival will take place from Friday, April 4 to Sunday, April 6, 2025.


PORTRAIT:






The Lyon Biennial: a key event on the international art scene

The Lyon Biennial of Contemporary Art, one of the five most important in the world, serves as a powerful ambassador for the city. In 2024, the 17th Biennale de Lyon will present an edition titled *La voie des fleuves*, inviting the public to explore the city and its surroundings through a fresh artistic lens. The Biennale offers an extensive range of works throughout the city, aiming to involve visitors directly in the artistic experience. By engaging residents in the creation of the works, the Biennale strengthens its ties to the community and democratizes contemporary art.

This edition further reinforces the Biennale's regional involvement, with artistic interventions proposed at around fifteen venues across the Lyon metropolitan area and the Auvergne-Rhône-Alpes region. Artists have collaborated with volunteers to produce their creations, directly involving local populations in the creative process. To make the event even more accessible, special rates are offered, along with guided tours and workshops for children.

The 2024 edition of the **Lyon Biennial of Contemporary Art,** *La voie des fleuves*, will run from September 21, 2024, to January 5, 2025.

Sabine Longin, new general director of the Lyon Biennial: a rich career at the service of an emblematic institution

Appointed as the new head of the Lyon Biennial in June 2024, Sabine Longin brings a wealth of experience to this prestigious institution. With a varied career that includes roles such as Director of the Giacometti Foundation and Cultural Advisor to the French Embassy in Qatar, she has quickly established herself as a key figure in the French cultural scene.

Her appointment as General Manager of the Lyon Biennial which includes both the dance and contemporary art biennials, marks a new chapter in her career. Fully aware of the challenges faced by this international event, Sabine Longin's goal is to preserve its renowned status while adapting it to the evolving art world. Her ambition is to make the Lyon Biennial an unmissable event for art and dance enthusiasts, drawing an ever-growing audience.

By appointing prominent figures in their respective fields, Isabelle Bertolotti and Tiago Guedes, to direct the artistic aspects of the two biennials, Sabine Longin is reaffirming her commitment to promoting contemporary creation while relying on a strong network of partners. Her forward-thinking approach promises to inject new energy into the Lyon Biennial.

The Lyon Auditorium: programming to suit all tastes

The Auditorium-Orchestre national de Lyon offers a unique artistic experience accessible to all. From grand symphonies to original creations, as well as workshops and special encounters with artists, the wide range of cultural events allows everyone to fully immerse themselves in music. The Auditorium, an architectural gem of the 20th century, houses a 2,000-seat concert hall, a century-old symphony orchestra, and a magnificent Cavaillé-Coll organ, which is a true relic from the 1878 Universal Exhibition.

For over twenty years, the Auditorium-Orchestre national de Lyon has been dedicated to making music accessible to everyone. Through a variety of educational and participatory programs, the institution encourages all ages to discover, practice, and create music. As a leading venue for classical music, the Auditorium is not just for connoisseurs. With initiatives like *Midis de l'AO* and *siestes musicales*, it offers opportunities for musical discovery, even during lunch breaks. Additionally, cine-concerts introduce younger audiences to classical music, bridging the gap between different art forms



Les Grandes Locos: a new cultural hub not to be missed

Inaugurated in May 2024, Les Grandes Locos has quickly found its place in Lyon's cultural landscape. Housed in former SNCF workshops, this vast complex offers an eclectic program ranging from concerts to cultural and artistic exhibitions. Events like Les Nuits Sonores, the Lyon Street Food Festival, and the Biennale de Lyon have all found a fitting venue here.

The rehabilitation of this industrial site, carried out with a transitional urban planning approach, has created a vibrant and dynamic space accessible to all. Contributing to the revitalization of La Mulatière, the site stands as a living tribute to the history of French railways.

LDLC Arena: A multi-purpose venue at the heart of the metropolitan area

Located in Décines-Charpieu, the LDLC Arena is a premier sports and cultural venue. Opened at the end of 2023, it has quickly become a key facility in the Lyon metropolitan area. With a capacity of up to 16,000 spectators, this versatile venue hosts a wide range of events, including concerts, sports competitions, and cultural performances, with between 100 and 120 events taking place annually. Its modern architecture and state-of-the-art technology make it the perfect location for major events.

The LDLC Arena's financing relies on a mixed economic model, combining both public and private funding. This model has enabled the mobilization of significant resources, ensuring the long-term sustainability of the venue.

Lugdunum - Roman Museum and Theaters: A Historic Museum Undergoing a Renaissance

The *Musée Lugdunum*, an archaeological treasure trove, invites visitors to explore the history of Lyon and Roman Gaul. Founded in 1975 and part of the UNESCO-listed Roman theaters site since 2017, the museum offers a unique experience that blends history, culture, and heritage. With one of France's richest archaeological collections, it provides an immersive insight into Lyon's Gallo-Roman past.

Thanks to its dynamic temporary exhibitions and events, such as the Roman Festival and European Heritage Days, the museum attracts new visitors every year. It also offers free admission on summer weekends and the first Sunday of each month. These efforts have paid off, with record-breaking visitor numbers—over 918,000 people visited in 2023.

ZOOM ON:

Lugdunum and the Louvre: A Unique Encounter with the Roman Empire

The collaboration between the *Musée Lugdunum* and the *Musée du Louvre* is a remarkable achievement, underscoring Lyon's international standing. The temporary exhibition *Un Empire, des peuples* is a major event that highlights the ambition and dynamism of the *Musée Lugdunum*. Through the stories of six key figures, the exhibition offers an unprecedented look at the cultural diversity of the Roman Empire.

Showcasing exceptional works, the exhibition provides a truly unique experience for the public. This collaboration is the result of years of effort and emphasizes the importance of partnerships between cultural institutions to enrich the cultural landscape and showcase France's heritage.

Arty Farty: A Pioneer of Inclusive and Sustainable Culture

Founded in 1999, the non-profit organization Arty Farty has become a landmark on Lyon's cultural scene. Best known for its Nuits Sonores festival, it has established itself as a key player in promoting electronic music across Europe. The association is deeply committed to inclusion and diversity, providing emerging artists with a platform for expression and developing cultural projects that are accessible to all audiences.

Arty Farty is also actively involved in European initiatives, such as the Reset! Network project, launched in 2022 with support from the EU. By creating a European network of independent cultural players, Arty Farty helps to strengthen cultural diversity in Europe and advocates for values like freedom of expression and equality.

CCO La Rayonne: A Living and Creative Space Open to All

La Rayonne is a cultural venue that includes a concert hall and a third-location center managed by the Centre Culturel Œcuménique (CCO) in the heart of Villeurbanne's Autre Soie district. A cultural pioneer in Lyon since 1963, the CCO is a non-profit organization that has always prioritized people and diversity. Thanks to the dedication of its teams, the CCO continues to explore new avenues and propose innovative projects.

The Autre Soie urban development project, which houses La Rayonne, is an ambitious endeavor that reinvents the art of living together. With 293 housing units, a 1,000-seat concert hall, coworking spaces, artistic workshops, and a public park, this unique site offers a wide range of unparalleled experiences for both residents and visitors. As the project aptly puts it, "Culture helps forge a link between everyone", making Autre Soie a special space for encounters and exchanges.

Opening in 2023, CCO *La Rayonne* is much more than just a concert hall. It is a true living space where culture, creation, and citizenship come together. With a strong focus on sustainability, *La Rayonne* contributes to the ecological transition by incorporating innovative energy-efficient solutions and waste management practices.

The Opéra de Lyon: A Committed Player in the Ecological Transition

The *Opéra de Lyon* is a prime example of a cultural institution dedicated to sustainable development. By implementing an ambitious environmental policy, the Opéra is reducing its ecological footprint while offering high-quality programming. The environmental transition strategy is based on three key pillars, both territorial and sector-specific:

- 1. "Nourish the imagination, give birth to new narrative": The Opéra de Lyon aims to promote artistic creation and make the art of opera accessible to all. This is achieved through adapted solutions, cultural mediation initiatives, and touring performances (with initiatives such as flexible pricing, free events, and cultural programs for young audiences...).
- 2. "Thinking up a new model for the production and distribution of works": The second pillar contributes to transforming the models for producing works: favoring a collaborative financing approach for new productions with other opera houses, ensuring a broad number of performances on a European scale, and focusing on eco-design for sets...

3. "Reducing carbon footprint, boosting energy efficiency": The Opéra is committed to reducing waste (currently serving as a pilot site for the City of Lyon's «zero waste» initiative), improving the energy performance of its buildings, and integrating environmental criteria into its purchasing practices (such as reducing water and energy consumption, replacing over 90% of lighting with LEDs, etc.).

The Opéra de Lyon's Comprehensive Environmental Commitment

Woodstower: A Festival Committed to the Environment and Accessibility

For 25 years, the Woodstower festival has been a must-attend event, offering a diverse program that blends rap, electro, shows, stand-up comedy, conferences, workshops, and entertainment, featuring over 50 established and emerging artists. Held every summer for four days on the shores of Grand Parc Miribel Jonage lake, the festival showcases a mix of genres, such as electro and rap, bringing together both international and regional talent.

Since its creation, Woodstower has made the environment and accessibility central to its mission, earning its place as one of the Top 5 eco-friendly festivals in France. The festival takes concrete steps to reduce its environmental impact, using recycled materials, managing waste, and providing access to drinking water. Woodstower is also committed to making the festival accessible to all audiences. It offers reduced rates (€25 for a day pass instead of €45) for residents of nearby communities, ensuring the event is more affordable for the local public, and providing accessibility for people with disabilities, including adapted toilets and accessible podiums. Woodstower proves that it is possible to organize a major event while addressing both environmental and social issues.



Nurturing Tomorrow's Talent: A New Generation of Artists

CNSMD Lyon

A benchmark in the world of music and dance, Lyon's *Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique et de Danse* (CNSMD) trains the next generation of talent for the artistic stage. By forging strong connections with professionals in the field, the CNSMD prepares its students for a demanding artistic career and equips them with the tools to succeed in the international cultural arena.

As a center of excellence in visual arts and design, the *École Nationale Supérieure des Beaux- Arts de Lyon* supports students in their artistic journey. By providing a framework that fosters experimentation and innovation, Ensba helps new forms of artistic expression come to life.

CinéFabrique

This unique film school offers free, accessible training to all, promoting diversity and inclusion in the audiovisual industry. By training professionals capable of telling original, socially engaged stories, *CinémaFabrique* contributes to enriching the French cinematic landscape.

An International City of Circus Arts: A Large-Scale Project

By 2028, the region will be home to the *Cité Internationale des Arts du Cirque*, an ambitious project that will strengthen the region's position as a major hub for artistic creation. This unique venue will bring together training schools, circus companies, and spaces for creation and distribution, providing circus artists with an exceptional platform to develop their talents.

This city will serve as a true catalyst for the growth of circus arts in France and internationally, fostering exchanges between artists, researchers, and audiences.
